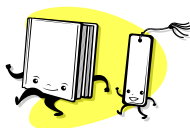

BULK PICK-UP SCHEDULED FOR JUNE 4th-6th

We are pleased to announce that we will be having a bulk pick-up on Monday through Wednesday, June 4th – 6th. Residents may haul their bulk items to the dumpster located at 44 Maple Street for disposal or they can place items at the curb and Village employees will pick them up.

THINGS TO REMEMBER:

- Items should be placed by the curb the night before pick-up.
- Tires and regular trash will not be accepted.
- Place loose items in a box or container for disposal. This will keep items from rolling or blowing into the street or sidewalks.
- If you want old trashcans or barrels disposed of please identify them as “trash”.
- Propane tanks, air-conditioning and refrigeration units cannot be accepted.



This service is intended for Village residents only. Please do not invite others from surrounding areas to participate. This could increase our costs therefore running the risk of this service being discontinued.

ZONING EXTERIOR MAINTENANCE CODES

Our Exterior Maintenance Code sets minimum standards so a property owner clearly knows what maintenance is expected. Properties should be structurally sound, free of nuisances, unsanitary conditions and hazards in order to protect occupants and pedestrians and to protect property values.

Listed below are a few of the most often cited violations:

Refuse: Properties should be free of broken glass, stumps, garbage and other debris.

Yards: All yards, courts, and lots shall be kept free of overgrown grasses, debris and other materials which may cause a fire, health, safety hazard or general unsightliness.

General Maintenance: Exterior walls, trim, doors and window casing of every structure and accessory building should be structurally sound and maintained so as to avoid any blighting effects on neighboring properties. Exteriors shall be painted or protected where necessary for the purpose of preservation. Exteriors shall also be free of broken windows, peeling paint or other conditions that reflect deterioration.

Roofs, Gutters and Downspouts: Roofs should be maintained to prevent dampness in the interior portion of the building. Drainage should be collected in suitable downspouts and be maintained so as not to clog, leak or adversely affect adjacent properties. Connecting any pipe carrying storm water to a sanitary sewer is prohibited.

Storage: Except as provided for in other regulations of the Village, all outdoor Storage of any kind shall be prohibited.

Junk, inoperable or Unlicensed Vehicle: Shall not be located on any residential property, except when stored within a completely enclosed building.

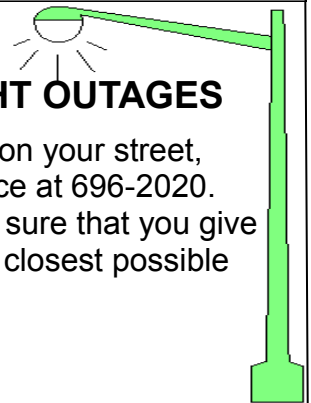
Know what's below.
Call before you dig.

There are several underground utility lines in your yard – from natural gas or water lines to cable and electric wire. So when you're updating your landscaping this spring, putting up a privacy fence, digging, make sure you **call before you dig** to have those lines marked and avoid striking them.

Simply call 811 – It's free and it's the law.

REPORT STREET LIGHT OUTAGES

If you have a street light out on your street, please notify the Village Office at 696-2020. When you call, please make sure that you give your name, address and the closest possible address to the streetlight.



PERMITS – HEADS UP

As we move into the "home improvement" season, please take note that an application for zoning compliance must be obtained before any structure can be built, altered or added to. This includes fences, sheds, pools, patios, decks, side-walks and gazebos.

It is extremely important that swimming pool compliance be adhered to. Building permits are required for all swimming pools of 24 inches or more in depth or greater than 150 square feet in surface area, including inflatable pools. The swimming pool or the entire property on which it is located must be walled or fenced to prevent uncontrolled access by children from the street or adjacent properties. The wall or fence must be at least 6 feet in height, in good condition and with a gate and lock. Another option is a deck package in which the top rail of the deck is 6 feet above the ground and a ladder that swings up and locks top prevent access to the pool. Hot tubs and spas are subject to the same regulations except a locking cover may be used instead of a fence. There are additional requirements.

GENERAL FUND RENEWAL LEVY

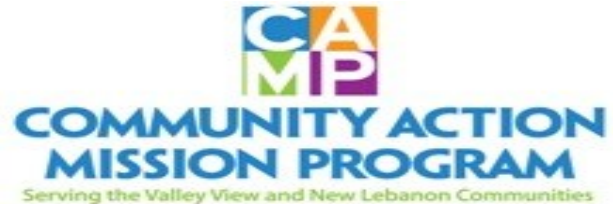
On August 7th, Farmersville residents will be asked to pass a two and a half (2.5) mill general fund renewal levy. The current 5-year levy will expire at the end of 2012. The residents of the Village need to know that this is **NOT** a new tax. It is a General Fund Levy originally passed in 1998. The money will go into the General Fund and will be used to provide and maintain current operating expenses used directly in the operation of the Village. This renewal levy will generate approximately \$35,035 each year.

Please support your Village and Council by voting YES on August 7th.

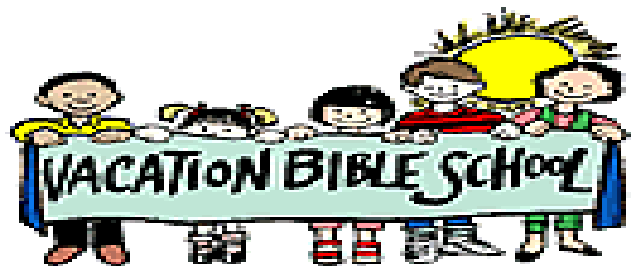

MESSAGE FROM THE JACKSON TOWNSHIP ZONING DEPARTMENT

Winter is over and spring is here. Now is the time to get started and clean up around the house and property. Inspections are being been done and many have received letters regarding Zoning violations occurring on their property. Section 2803 – Accessory Uses Not Permitted – Agricultural, Residential, Office and Business Districts of the Jackson Township Zoning Resolution states the following:

Outdoor storage, such as but not limited to: junk, wood, lumber, building materials, parking of inoperative or unlicensed motor vehicles or similar items of property, unless specifically permitted by the specific zoning district regulations shall not be permitted as an Accessory Use in Agricultural, Residential, Office or business Districts.

If you want to build any type of structure you must first obtain a Zoning permit from the Zoning Department. If you fail to obtain this permit you will be in violation of the Jackson Township Zoning Resolution as well as the Montgomery County Building Department Regulations. So please call the office at (937) 696-3010. You could be fined as well as court order to remove this or any structure constructed without a permit.

Are you having a Garage Sale?

The City of Germantown Council has passed new legislation regarding Garage Sales. Listed below are a few of the new regulations/rules for having a garage sale in the City.

- All "Sales" Garage, Porch, Yard, Carport, Patio, Basement, Driveway or Rummage-must obtain a permit from the City Office at least three (3) days prior to the sale.
- No sale shall exceed three (3) days.
- No property may have more than two (2) sales in one calendar year. This does not include the City Community Garage Sales.
- All sales must be between the hours of 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- No material from the sale, including signs and material may be visible for public view after 8:30 p.m. on the last day of the sale.
- No sign shall be posted in the public right-of-way, which includes utility poles, traffic lights, street lights, traffic control devices, or tree lawns. Signs that are posted in the public right-of-way are subject to removal and disposal by the Municipality.

Water Tip

Every year, American consumers waste billions of dollars on billions of gallons of bottled water. Are you one of them? Let's say you drink the recommended 64 ounces of water a day, all from bottles. That's 24 half-liter bottles every six days. Even at bargain prices, that comes to more than \$400 a year. If you choose a stylish name brand—that figure can soar to the thousands of dollars a year. But the water from your own tap? It costs just a fraction of a penny per day. Based on averages from the American Water Works Association a day's worth of water costs only 0.001 cents. So if you drink your 64 ounces daily, you spend just 51 cents – per year! Remember these facts!

- Unlike tap water, bottled water creates mountains of waste and contributes to an array of other environmental problems.

- Destroys 62 million trees a year.

- 44% is unopened, unread and trashed.

Litter-Facts & Prevention

A statewide study conducted by ODNR found that over 11 thousand tons of litter accumulates on Ohio's road ways each year. This litter just doesn't appear—it's the result of careless attitudes and waste handling. Is there anything to do about it? Knowing more about litter and where it comes from is a good place to start. Most people blame motorists and pedestrians for the large amount of litter but according to Keep America Beautiful they are just two of seven primary sources:

- Household trash at the curbside
- Dumpsters used by businesses
- Loading docks
- Construction and demolition sites
- Uncovered trucks
- Motorist
- Pedestrians

The act of littering can harm the environment in many ways. Litter can cause injury to area wildlife, pose threats to human health and is aesthetically displeasing.

Things you can do to help with this messy problem:

- Carry a litterbag in your car, boat and on your bicycle.
- Securely cover trash containers to prevent wind or animals from spreading litter
- Cover and secure any vehicle, truck or trailer carrying a load. Tarps can prevent litter from falling or blowing onto the roadside
- When visiting parks make sure to leave the area clean for the next person to enjoy

Severe Weather Awareness

April is upon us and with that comes tornado season!

April through July are the peak months that tornadoes occur in Ohio.

The best defense when faced with weather warnings or any severe weather event is preparedness. If local authorities issue a tornado watch, remain alert for approaching storms, keep an eye on the sky and stay tuned to the radio or television.

If a tornado warning is issued, take shelter immediately!

Stay informed by listening to a NOAA weather radio that can alert you to approaching severe weather.
