The Farmersville Village Council met in regular session on February 25, 2019, in the Village of Farmersville Council Chambers at 117 E. Walnut St. Mayor Weller called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm; Mayor Weller led the group in prayer; the Pledge of Allegiance was recited and followed by a roll call.

Mr. Roach moved, Ms. Neitman seconded to approve the minutes of February 11, 2019. Roll Call: Mr. Roach: yes, Mr. Craig: yes, Ms. Neitman: yes, Mr. Dowden: yes, Mr. Lamb: yes, Mr. Holderman: yes. MOTION PASSED

Mr. Dowden moved, Ms. Neitman seconded to approve the bills for this payment period voucher no 32-33-2019 and warrant no 34497-34517 totaling \$19,192.03. Roll Call: Mr. Holderman: yes, Mr. Dowden: yes, Mr. Lamb: yes, Ms. Neitman: yes, Mr. Roach: yes, Mr. Craig: yes. MOTION PASSED

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Jon Kibler announced that the sunrise service will be on April 21st at 6:30 a.m. at the Church at Farmersville.

Gina McFarlane and Davenie Breeding Centers presented information about the Five Rivers Health Centers and the services that they provide. They explained that there is grant money available to open a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) in or near Farmersville. This federally funded, multi-dimensional health center may offer medical, pharmacy, substance abuse, and dental services. There was discussion about the need for affordable pharmacy services in the Village and possible locations for the center. To move forward, the Village Council will need to submit a letter of support.

LAW DIRECTOR COMMENTS

Mr. Brunk reported that there have been some complaints about slow speed vehicles in the Village and explained that a UTV is not a slow speed vehicle with lights and brakes. There was discussion about the public safety issue of the allowing slow speed vehicles on Village streets and the hit and miss enforcement of the law. For instance, it is okay to operate slow speed vehicles on Village streets during snow events; but it is not okay to operate slow speed vehicles to go and pick up a pizza. Chief Schade stated that he could set up an inspection station and certify vehicles if the Village wanted to allow them. Mr. Brunk stated that the Village would have to pass legislation to allow for slow speed vehicles. Mr. Dowden stated that he wants to make it clear with no ambiguity. The matter was referred to the Planning and Service Committees. Mr. Brunk announced that he had accepted a new job and was not going to be able to serve as the Village Law Director.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Finance Committee met this evening and signed the bank reconciliations. Ms. Schenck provided the end of year report for 2018. She reported that the income tax revenue for 2018 was \$171,227.59 more than 12% over the projected revenue of \$150,000.

Ms. Schenck provided the following information about the property tax levy revenue received compared to the revenue projections from the Montgomery County Auditor.

Mr. Edds presented the following report on work performed from February 11 to February 25, 2019:

- Meet with Mike Martin in regards to fabrication of bar screen and weir plate for WWTP.
- Work with Doug Kramer in regards to water tower bid spec for water tower rehab.
- Meet with Mr Martintoni with Utility Sales for quotes on meters, pits, and water line for Hemple Rd Phase 3.
- Inspection performed by EPA Rep. Scott Eardley for the generator transfer switch grant. Our inspection passed with flying colors and has completed our grant process for the EPA. We should have grant money disbursement within the next 30 days. In all, this grant saved the Village close to \$6000, not to mention all the man hours of back washing our plant in the event of a power outage.

- Additional pictures of water tower for Kramer & Assoc. for bid process.
- Meet with Tim Ballard at Manning Rd to check for potential leak. He feels that there is no leak in that area.
- Check for furnace issues at Community Center. I did advise Park Board that they need to look at replacing both furnaces as well as A/C units ASAP.
- Garage door cable broke at shop. Called Dayton Overhead door for repair.
- Contact 3 residents in regards to R/W extension.
- Update contingency plan.
- Snow Removal and treat roadways.

- Meet with Tim Ballard to check for potential leak at residence on California St. Nothing found. Contacted resident that there was no leak found in the area.
- Daily Water and Waste Water Plant duties.
- Complete bi-weekly report.
